# Dominic Bash, hairdresser who helped AIDS victims

Dominic Bash, 46, a South Street hairdresser who ministered to men dying of AIDS and made flamboyant public appearances in drag, died Sunday at his South Philadelphia home of complications from AIDS.

Mr. Bash, who had pale, shoulderlength, blond hair, loved to be outra-

Last year, he led the Lesbian and Gay Pride Parade, strutting from Rit-tenhouse Square to Penn's Landing in-a purple-and-pink sequined leotard and a lavender feathered boa.

In 1991, Mr. Bash was master of ceremonies at the third annual Coming Out Block Party on Pine Street. He wore a tight black skirt, fishnet stockings and a tiara.

Dominic was sort of a working, living example of what being out of the closet really means," said David Fair, director of We the People Liv-ing With AIDS.
"He was joyful," Fair said. "Domi-

nic celebrated every moment of his life, even his anger. And he had a lot of anger. He was very bitter about how he was treated as a gay man by his church, and how people with AIDS were treated."

He found a positive outlet for his anger.

In 1973, Mr. Bash, a former seminarian, co-founded Dignity of Philadelphia Inc., a church group for gay and-lesbian Catholics. For the last dozen years, he was coordinator for Dignity's AIDS ministry.

In that role, he visited hundreds of men dying of AIDS, and he managed to stay remarkably upbeat. On the dashboard of his car, he had a sign that read, "Expect a miracle." There was no miracle, but Mr. Bash hugged and kissed AIDS victims anyway. He also helped men renew their spirituality and plan their funerals.

It was emotionally draining work.

"After the first experiences, I cried my eyes out," Bash said in a 1991 interview. "Now, I just feel like the guide, guiding men along. I just give a little nurturing, loving and caring that they're not getting from mother church.

"He gave to people what he so much wanted for himself — unconditionel love," said Joseph Ciavarella, a close friend.

Mr. Bash was always hugging peo-

When he went to Mass, and it was time for people to offer each other the sign of peace, Mr. Bash hugged everyone in sight.

"They had to hold up the Mass because he was still working the crowd," Ciavarella recalled.

So none of the time Mr. Bash spent in the seminary was ever wasted.

"Dominic was a priest in the true sense of the word," Fair said. "He had the three essentials of being a priest: He truly cared about people, he understood what God meant to people and he knew how to dress up.

Mr. Bash was a Kensington native who-graduated from North Catholic High School in 1965. He was seminarian in the Oblate of St. Francis De-

"I was brought up as a Roman Catholic, being taught to love one another," Mr. Bash said in the 1991 interview. "Yet they couldn't love me and I couldn't live a lie. They say they hate the sin and not the sinner, but that's bull. You cannot separate my sexuality from me."

At his South Street salon, the Abbey, Mr. Bash cut hair while his Siberian husky, Natasha, hung out looking for treats. His customers included many nuns, whose haircuts were always free. Mr. Bash often amused his patrons with stories

about the social life of seminarians, or the latest parties he attended on his last all-gay cruise.

He was so honest about who he was that he forced people to make a decision: lighten up or check out.

One of crossdressing inspirations was Madonna. When Mr. Bash

strapped on his cone-shaped bra and the rest of his vamp costume, he dubbed himself MaDominic.

"He scared me." Ciavarella said. "He was all the stereotypes of what a gay person is supposed to be."

Ciaverella recalled watching Mr.
Bash parade around in drag and
thinking to himself, "This man is
being all of who he is and saying 'To
hell with you.'

Mr. Bash sometimes made the cler-

gy just as uneasy.
"He challenged traditional religious people to expand their under-standing of the place of religion in your life," said the Rev. Rodger Broadley, rector of the Episcopal Church of St. Luke and the Epiphany, of which Bash was a member.
"He really believed that your whole life, every aspect of your life, was related to your religious spirituality," the rector said.

Mr. Bash made a habit of showing up at city shelters for the homeless, where he cut hair for free. He got to know the people on a first-name ba-

"Renee likes her head shaved, then she wants me to put a part in it," he said in a 1984 interview. "It looks like somebody put an ax through her

In 1991, Mr. Bash helped organized demonstration where protesters om Act Up, the AIDS Coalition to Unleash Power, sprinkled condoms on the altar of the Cathedral Basilica of SS. Peter and Paul. Cardinal Anthony J. Bevilacqua was preaching at the time.

Mr. Bash met the cardinal on many occasions, once giving him a flag that represented gay and lesbian people. He also offered the cardinal unsolicited fashion tips.

Four years ago, Mr. Bash tested

positive for HIV, the virus that causes AIDS.

"All my friends have passed," he said in a 1991 interview. "I don't know why I'm still around."

Mr. Bash was afraid of pain, but he never feared death.

"It's an experience you only do once," he once told a man who was dying of AIDS. "Death is like a roller coaster. At the end of the ride, you're going to end up in the hands of God. So enjoy the ride."

He is survived by his mother, Marge, and two brothers.

A memorial service will be held at p.m. Saturday at St. Luke and the Epiphany.
