battle he could not win. His struggle to survive was remarkable, and his courage in the face of death was to be truly admired.

Vic was born in West Philadelphia on May 20, 1946. He was the son of the late Henry and Molly Allekotte and also the brother of the late Martin Allekotte. He was graduated from West Catholic Boys High School and attended La Salle College where he received a B. A. In Literature. He also attended Temple University where he received his Master's in Special Education. This was to be Vic's true calling.

In the early 1970's Vic was one of the first hired in the newly created Special Education Department of the School District of Philadelphia, He taught reading and math to the children who where mentally and/or physically handicapped. He worked at the Joseph W. Catharine Elementary School in Southwest Philadelphia his entire career. In fact, many of his former students later became the parents of his newer students. He was truly a fixture in Room 308. While working at Catharine, the faculty and staff become more than co-workers. They were, and still are, a part of his family.

Due to his illnesses in 1994 Vic was forced to retire. He could no longer withstand the physical rigors of the job. It was at this point that he became involved with many community groups. He was very active with s eral Alcoholics Anonymous group primarily Recovery Clubhouse. He a did volunteer work at times w ActionAIDS, the AIDS Fund, the AI Library, PCHA, Safeguards, Philadelp Fight and also served on the Resou Allocation Advisory Committee Ryan White funding.

In addition to his community servi Vic had many other interests. He v an animal lover, listened to "class jazz, loved fine arts, books, and newly purchased home. He alwa seemed to be going through one ca log or another, looking for that perf item to help restore the house to original state. He was an incredible m with a passion for life. He will be sor missed.

Vic is survived by his husband/ partner of almost 22 years, Steph Bowers, and their children: Duke dog and Gilda the cat. He is also s vived by Mr. Bowers' family: Joe Ar (nee Bowers) and Robert Hickey; Diar (nee Bowers) and Karl Safran, and th children Dianne Joan and Karl Steph Safran.

A memorial service will be held Tuesday, April 25 at 7:30 p.m. St. Lu and The Epiphany Church Chapel, 3 S. 13<sup>th</sup> Street, Philadelphia, PA.
