"We're very excited about this program," she concluded, "because it's high quality, it's easy to listen to and you can learn a lot in half an hour."

"I'm a pioneer," he stated.

While serving on the Human Relations Commission, Kim heard no sexual minority cases, but "my interests became broader," he said. "I'm touched, thankful and surprised" at support from the lesbian and gay community, he said. "I'm gladdened—these people are different, and this means that people of different character like me. I cannot promise anything, but will try to help."

Kim supports gay marriages, including for city employees who would receive the same benefits as straights. Being raised by a "genius" mother who earned two and a half degrees in a time when it was difficult for women to be educated influenced him to respect women's rights. Although he has never heard of a case of a Philadelphia Asian with AIDS, he thinks the preference in some Asian cultures to keep news of illness within the family may be a reason, and "that's not right. I don't agree. There must be AIDS—sickness should be treated."

When asked if he favored condom distribution in public schools—an issue which is outside the focus of his campaign—Kim waved aside a political handler, explaining, "He has a lot of political experience, but I want
