Barry S. Kohn, lawyer and author

Barry Stanton Kohn, 44, a lawyer, civil rights advocate and former marriage and sex counselor, died yesterday at his home in Radnor after a long illness.

Although his work as a deputy attorney general for the state kept him before the public during the 1970s, it was his work as an author that captured the headlines.

With his wife, Alice Matusow, he wrote *Barry and Alice, Portrait of a Bisexual Marriage*, a book marketed in 1980 that dealt with their mutual and sometimes shared love.

While the book was not treated kindly by critics, it won a degree of praise for its bold approach. It also

brought the couple to network television. They appeared to talk about the book and their sexual preferences on such programs as the Phil Donahue show.

Their private lives became completely public.

An honors student and graduate of Temple University, Mr. Kohn was a graduate of Dickinson Law School and was admitted to the bar in 1967. He spent the next two years with the Peace Corps in Panama. When he returned to Philadelphia, he became an attorney with Community Legal Services here.

From 1971 to 1977, he served as a deputy state attorney general and

was in the center of legal battles over the Tocks Island Dam proposal as well as civil and gay rights. He resigned to write the book and to work as a counselor.

Subsequently, he worked as a pastry chef, transportation coordinator for the Spoleto Festival in Charleston, S.C., and, in 1985 and 1986, as front-desk manager of La Terraza Marti Hotel in Key West, Fla.

Surviving are his son, Daniel Mark; daughter, Mulford Kohn; his mother, Elaine Toltzis; two brothers, and a sister.
